One More Birthday: Knute Rockne

Although he was not a member of the Torske Klub, we acknowledge the birthday of Knute Rockne this month. Knute Kenneth Rockne was a football genius who put his own original stamp on the game with the exploitation of the forward pass, a move that brought finesse and a certain artistry to a game that had been, up to then, a thing of brute force. He did this at a small Catholic college in South Bend, Indiana, which grew, largely on the strength of its football program, into the great University of Notre Dame.

Rockne was born on March 4, 1888 in Voss, Norway, but landed at Notre Dame after his parents emigrated to the Logan Square area of Chicago in 1893. He attended Brentano Grammar school and later Tuley High. Certainly he had some familiarity with the Norway Center there (where our group had its origins).



Knute entered Notre Dame at the persuasion of friends and his interest in sports led to formation of football history.

Knute unleashed the forward pass in a game against the dominant Army team, at West Point, N.Y., in 1913. Knute was the quarterback, and Gus Dorais the sticky-fingered end, in a game that Notre Dame

won, 35-13. Rockne stayed on at ND as coach. In his 13 years as head coach, his teams won 105 games, lost 12 and tied 5.

Knute Rockne was also the man behind the Four Horsemen. They were introduced by Rockne in the 1924 season. This great backfield of Harry Stuhldreher, Don Miller, Jim Crowley, and Elmer Layden led Notre Dame to a 28-2 record. The Four Horsemen still stand unique as a backfield. Knute Rockne was the man who discovered and coached a most dazzling, dramatic, and idolized athlete, George Gipp. Gipp's running, passing, kicking, and generalship lifted Notre Dame to fame. Gipp also became Notre Dame's first All-American and famous for Rockne's motivating half-time locker room speech, "Win one for the Gipper".

Knute died in a plane crash in Kansas in 1931. ■
